Dr. Melanie Beals Goan | Keynote Speaker

Nursing Reimagined | The Frontier Nursing Service's Innovations in Rural Health Care

Melanie Beals Goan is a professor of history at the University of Kentucky. She is originally from Erie, Pennsylvania, but has lived in Kentucky since 1994. She earned a BA in history from Slippery Rock University and a MA and PhD from the University of Kentucky. Her research interests and teaching focus include twentieth century U. S. history, Kentucky history, gender, and the history of health care. In 2008, she published Mary Breckinridge: The Frontier Nursing Service and Rural Health in Appalachia (University of North Carolina Press). University Press of Kentucky published her most recent book, A Simple Justice: Kentucky Women Fight for the Vote in 2020.

CONTINUING EDUCATION INFORMATION

Professional development contact hours will be provided. This nursing professional development activity was approved by the Ohio Nurses Association, an accredited approver by the American Nurses Credentialing Center's Commission on Accreditation. Ren Capucao, PhD Candidate


This grant is designed to encourage and support graduate training and historical research at the Masters and Doctoral levels.




