Two Frontier Healers: How Well-behaved Women Make History

Dr. Ulrich will compare stories from the diaries of two frontier midwives, Martha
Moore Ballard, who delivered babies, nursed the sick, and laid out the dead in the
Kennebec River country of Maine from 1785–1812, and Patty Bartlett Sessions, who
was born in 1795 not far from Martha Ballard's home, but died in the territory of
